Ray Newcomb of Pembroke, New Hampshire Elected 2024 NAAA President

JBI Helicopter Services has 97 employees and 20 aircraft. About 48% of JBI's work is agricultural and they also treat forest land, conduct powerline patrol services and external load transporting. The company treats 410,000 agricultural acres a year in 32 states from Maine to Washington state.

Newcomb's passion for aviation, long-time career in agricultural aviation and protecting the best interests of the industry make it easy to understand why he was chosen as NAAA's new president. At NAAA, Newcomb has served on the NAAA Board of Directors since 2017, including treasurer in 2023 and secretary in 2022. He has also been active in chairing NAAA's committees including Budget & Finance Committee Chairman in 2023, Governing Documents Committee Chairman in 2022 and Vice Chairman in 2020 and 2021 and Government Relations Vice Chairman in 2022.

Newcomb looks forward to communicating the many benefits NAAA provides to the industry and the general public in regard to education. "People have a right to know what we're doing just as I have a right to do what I'm doing," said Newcomb. He believes that publicly addressing people's concerns has been a benefit of paramount importance to the work of aerial applicators. "Educating the public is a big thing.
